Alice McDonald

Alice McDonald is a third-year undergraduate at Juilliard as a student of Charles Neidich. She studied with Alan Kay at Juilliard Pre-College. McDonald has participated in festivals including the Boston University Tanglewood Institute, National Symphony Orchestra Summer Music Institute, Yellow Barn's Young Artists Program, and Norfolk Chamber Music Festival. She has appeared on NPR's From the Top, was named a National YoungArts Foundation Finalist in classical music, won the Juilliard Pre-College Open Concerto Competition, and was a finalist in Juilliard's Copland Clarinet Concerto Competition. Last year, McDonald was among a small number of Juilliard students who traveled to the Royal Academy of Music in London to perform and record an all-Stravinsky program under the direction of Barbara Hannigan.

Ashley Yoon

Ashley Yoon, violinist and chamber musician from Charleston, is a fourth-year undergraduate at Juilliard studying with Joseph Lin. She was recently a fellow at the Norfolk Chamber Music Festival last summer, supported by the Fishman Family Foundation. She has performed at the Metropolitan Museum of Art and won the American Protégé International Competition. In 2019, Yoon was invited to play at Carnegie Hall. Her mentors include the Brentano Quartet and Michael Kannen. She has attended the Taos School of Music (2022), YellowBarn, Great Mountains Festival, Morningside Music Bridge, and the Four Seasons Chamber Music Festival. Outside of her musical adventures, Yoon is an avid reader and swimmer, with a deep appreciation of nature and art.

Claire Arias-Kim is finishing her bachelor's at Juilliard studying with Laurie Smukler. Arias-Kim has been a soloist with the Fairbanks, Elgin, and LaCrossse symphony orchestras; Oistrakh Symphony of Chicago; Lincolnwood and Ottawa chamber orchestras; and Lakeview Orchestra. She spent three summers at the Aspen Music Festival under a full scholarship studying with Robert Lipsett. She was also a featured artist on WFMT's Introductions, where she performed a recital that was simulcast live. For three consecutive years, Arias-Kim has been selected to participate with her chamber ensemble in the quarterfinals of the Fischoff Chamber Music Competition, where she also advanced to the semifinals as a member of Trio Sarrasin. Her awards in chamber music include second prize in the Rembrandt Chamber Competition as well as first prize and the grand award winner in the Barnett Chamber Music Competition.

Lila Holyoke (Pre-College '22, cello) is a first-year student in the Barnard-Columbia-Juilliard exchange under the tutelage of Natasha Brofsky and Clara Kim. Holyoke began studying cello at age 5 and attended Juilliard Pre-college throughout high school, graduating with distinction in performance. In November, Chang's string quartet was one of the chamber groups representing Juilliard at the inaugural California Festival in Los Angeles, performing Gabriella Smith's *Carrot Revolution* and selections from Kris Bowers' score for the movie *Origin*. Chang is a first-year master's student at Juilliard under the guidance of Joel Krosnick.

Cheng lo Lo

Cheng Io Lo is a first-year master's student at Juilliard studying with Laurie Smukler and Daniel Phillips. She was formerly a student of Nicholas Mann at Manhattan School of Music precollege, where she served as concertmaster of the Symphony Orchestra. She was recently named by the *Sandi Klein* Show as one of America's leading Creative Women, honored at the U.N., and awarded the International Father Eugène Merlet Award for community service for her work in prisons and with refugees around the globe as the founding director for Project: Music Heals Us, a nonprofit that brings free chamber music performances and interactive programming to marginalized populations with limited ability to access the arts themselves. She has performed across five continents and been featured in the *New York Times, Forbes*, and the *Wall Street Journal* as well as on PBS, CNN, NPR, and BBC World News. Violist of the Juilliard String Quartet and the Carr-Petrova Duo, Carr serves on the faculties of Juilliard and the Manhattan School of Music.

Valerie Kim (Pre-College '16; BM '20, MM '22, violin), violinist and sometime pianist, leads a colorful solo and collaborative career based in New York City. She is pursuing her doctorate at Juilliard, where she began studying at age 12 in Pre-College on both violin and piano; she has studied violin with Catherine Cho, Li Lin, Itzhak Perlman, and Donald Weilerstein.
