## The John Houseman Prize

Established by Joan Houseman in spring 1994 to honor the memory of the Juilliard Drama Division's founding director, the John Houseman Prize, in the form of a living-expense stipend, is awarded annually to an acting student at the end of the third year of training who has demonstrated exceptional ability in classical theater.

Selected by the Drama Division faculty, the prizewinner for the 2024–25 academic year is Jawuan Tyler Hill.

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Scholarship support makes it possible for the school to continue to nurture the exceptional artists who go on to be the performers, educators, creators, and leaders that move the needle and broaden the stories that are told and heard through the performing arts.

With more than 90 percent of our students eligible to receive some measure of financial aid, scholarship funds are critical in enabling Juilliard to meet our students' needs.

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
