Caili Quan, Rena Butler, Norbert De La Cruz III, and Justin Peck are shining examples of how artists draw from their past while innovating and changing the field. After 70 years in the making, we are honored to perform on the Peter Jay Sharp Theater stage, full of joy, gratitude, and the great promise of the future.

About Juilliard Dance

Under the direction of Alicia Graf Mack, Juilliard Dance develops artists of the 21st century—trained in ballet, modern, and contemporary dance forms. With the establishment of the dance division in 1951—by then-president William Schuman with the guidance of founding division director Martha Hill—Juilliard became the first major teaching institution to combine equal instruction in both modern and ballet techniques.

In the four-year dance program—leading to a bachelor of fine arts degree—students learn the great traditions of both past and present. Juilliard dancers enjoy unparalleled opportunities to work with today's leading choreographers and perform both new and existing repertory. In addition to high caliber technical training and performances, dancers learn about the craft of choreography and immerse themselves in other facets of the field. Located at Lincoln Center in New York City, Juilliard prepares dancers for all the possibilities that lie ahead.

Juilliard dance alumni include the choreographers and directors Robert Battle, Pina Bausch, Jessica Lang, Lar Lubovitch, Andrea Miller, Ohad Naharin, and Paul Taylor. Juilliard dancers are currently dancing in Nederlands Dans Theater, Nederlands Dans Theater 2, Ballet BC, BJM, L.A. Dance Project, Limón Dance Company, GöteborgsOperans Danskompani, Ballett des Saarländisches Staatstheater, Kidd Pivot, and Batsheva Dance Company, among many others, as well as in several Broadway productions.

Juilliard's Dance Division was a proud recipient of the 2015 Capezio Award, the first educational institution to receive the honor.

About the Artists

Alicia Graf Mack

Alicia Graf Mack enjoyed a distinguished career as a leading dancer of Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater. She has also been a principal dancer with Dance Theatre of Harlem and Complexions Contemporary Ballet. Graf Mack has danced as a guest performer with Alonzo King's LINES Ballet, Beyoncé, John Legend, Andre 3000, and Alicia Keys. Graf Mack graduated magna cum laude with honors in history from Columbia University and holds an MA in nonprofit management from Washington University in St. Louis. In 2007, Smithsonian magazine named her an American Innovator of the Arts and Sciences. She is a recipient of the Columbia University Medal of Excellence, an award given each year to one alumnus who has demonstrated excellence in their field of work. In 2008, she delivered the keynote address to the graduates of Columbia University's School of General Studies. As a dance educator, Graf Mack most recently taught as adjunct faculty at the University of Houston and was a visiting assistant professor at Webster University. She is a co-founder of D(n)A Arts Collective, an initiative created to enrich the lives of young dancers through master classes and intensives. She began her inaugural season as director of the Juilliard Dance Division in fall 2018.



Mario Alberto Zambrano

Mario Alberto Zambrano received his early training from the Houston Ballet Academy and the High School for Performing and Visual Arts before joining Hubbard Street Dance Chicago at the age 17. In 1998, he joined Nederlands Dans Theater II, where he danced soloist roles in ballets choreographed by Jíri Kylián, Hans Van Manen, Paul Lightfoot and Sol Leon, Johan Inger, and Shusaku Takemuchi. In 2000, he accepted an invitation to join Batsheva Dance Company and was a member of the original creations of Ohad Naharin's Virus and Minus 16. Thereafter, he began studying literature at Open University in London while working intermittently as a guest artist with Ballet Frankfurt for the next four years. His honors in dance include a 1994 Presidential Scholar in the Arts Award and a 1995 Princess Grace Award. In 2013, he graduated from the Iowa Writers' Workshop with an MFA in English and published his debut novel Lotería with Harper Collins. As choreographer, writer, and educator, Zambrano has worked with Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Nederlands Dans Theater II, the Joffrey Ballet School, New School, Harvard University, Lewis and Clark University, University of Iowa, and Orsolina28 in Moncalvo, Italy. He has published fiction and nonfiction in The Brooklyn Rail, Guernica: Arts and Literature, Gulf Coast, and Ploughshares Journal, and has served as fiction editor and editor in chief for the award-winning literary journal 12th Street published by the New School. He came to Juilliard as associate director of the Dance Division from positions as assistant professor at Boston Conservatory at Berklee, program director at Orsolina28, and lecturer in Theater, Dance & Media at Harvard.

Caili Quan

Juilliard Creative Associate Caili Quan is a New York-based choreographer who danced with BalletX from 2013 to 2020. She has created works for BalletX, Nashville Ballet, Owen/Cox Dance Group, UC Santa Barbara, Columbia Ballet Collaborative, and Ballet Academy East. She served as an artistic partnership initiative fellow and a Toulmin Creator at the Center for Ballet and the Arts at NYU. With BalletX, she performed new works by Matthew Neenan, Nicolo Fonte, Gabrielle Lamb, Penny Saunders, and Trey McIntyre and danced at Jacob's Pillow Dance Festival, Vail Dance Festival, and Belgrade Dance Festival as well as in *DEMO* by Damian Woetzel at the Kennedy Center. This year, *Mahålang*, a short documentary that wove familial conversations of her Chamorro Filipino upbringing on Guam with scenes from BalletX's *Love Letter*, was shown at the Hawai'i International Film Festival, Asian American International Film Festival, and Center for Asian American Media Festival.

Rena Butler

Originally from Chicago, Rena Butler has previously performed with Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, AIM by Kyle Abraham, Bill T. Jones/Arnie Zane Company, David Dorfman Dance, Manuel Vignoulle/M-Motions, Kevin Wynn Collection, and Pasos Con Sabor Salsa Dance Company. She is a recipient of the 2019 Princess Grace Foundation Award for Choreography. Butler has created works for companies and institutions including Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, BalletX, Whim W'him, Boston Dance Theater, TedXChicago Virtual Salon 3.0: Design Your Life, and Gibney Company. Butler is an adjunct professor for NYU's Tisch School of the Arts for Dance. As Gibney Company's inaugural choreographic associate, Butler is featured on the cover of Dance Magazine's November 2021 issue.

Norbert De La Cruz III

Born in the Philippines and raised in California, Norbert De La Cruz III (BFA '10, dance) graduated from Juilliard and received his MFA in dance from Hollins University. He is a New York and L.A.-based freelance artist. He was a soloist with Ballet Torino, Aszure Barton, the Metropolitan Opera, Complexions, and Boca Tuya. He has been commissioned by Aspen Santa Fe Ballet, Tulsa Ballet, Barak Ballet, Hubbard Street, BalletX, Peridance, and Olympic Ballet Theatre. He was a finalist of Hubbard Street's National Choreographic Competition, a Princess Grace Foundation-USA award recipient, Alvin Ailey New Directions Choreography Lab, Joffrey Academy of Dance's Winning Works, the National Choreographic Initiative, and a recipient of the New York Choreographic Institute. Honorable mentions include the Asian Arts Alliance Jadin Wong Award and McCallum Theatre Choreography Festival Award; he was featured in *Dance Magazine*'s "Top 25 to Watch."

Justin Peck

Justin Peck is the resident choreographer and artistic advisor of New York City Ballet (NYCB). Peck has created more than 35 works for NYCB and other dance companies around the world including the Paris Opéra Ballet, San Francisco Ballet, Miami City Ballet, Pacific Northwest Ballet, Houston Ballet, and L.A. Dance Project. His works have also been performed by Dutch National Ballet, National Ballet of Canada, Acosta Danza, Hong Kong Ballet, Joffrey Ballet, Boston Ballet, and Pennsylvania Ballet. Peck first choreographed as a student at the School of American Ballet in 2005. He participated in a working session at the New York Choreographic Institute, an affiliate of NYCB, in 2009, and received its first yearlong choreographic residency, in 2011. He was named NYCB's resident choreographer, the second in the company's history, in 2014. Peck has been awarded the National Arts Award (2018), Golden Plate Honor from the Academy of Achievement (2019), Bessie Award for his ballet Rodeo: Four Dance Episodes (2015), Gross Family Prize for his ballet Everywhere We Go (2014), and Tony Award for choreography on Broadway's Carousel (2018).

Darryl J. Hoffman

Bronx native Darryl J. Hoffman is a composer based in Chicago. With his lifelong love for music, he developed a curiosity for sound and began creating at age 13. His compositions include works on Kansas City Ballet for choreographer Stephanie Martinez in collaboration with cellist Desiree Miller; Danceworks Chicago with choreography by Owen Scarlet; Visceral Dance Chicago's *Synapse*, choreographed by Nick Pupillo; Minnesota Dance Theatre for choreographer Darwin Black; three Philadanco works choreographed by Anthony Burrell and Christopher Huggins; Hubbard Street Dance Chicago, Ballet X, Gibney Company, and Whim W'him, choreographed by Rena Butler; and compositions for choreographer Ebony Williams' *Title IX* (2018) and *Victoria*, which premiered at Jacob's Pillow in 2019. Expanding his creative horizons last year by serving as musical director for Regional Dance America's National Choreography Summer Intensive, Hoffman continues to live his gift as he intends to shape the culture of music and dance with his sound while contributing in other arts.



Nathan Prillaman

Nathan Prillaman (MM '15, composition) is a composer and producer of film, classical, and dance music from Potomac, Maryland. Recent composition projects include the Student Academy award-winning musical film *Opera of Cruelty*, a multimedia immersive dance work in Paris with ACE Dance Concept, an award-winning score for the Canadian independent feature *Flora*, and collaborations with a wide variety of choreographers, most recently Norbert De La Cruz III, Emery LeCrone, and Quilan Arnold. Prillaman trained at Juilliard (where he now serves on the music technology faculty) and at Yale, studying with John Corigliano, Kathryn Alexander, and Michael Klingbeil.

Dan Deacon

Dan Deacon is a Baltimore-based recording artist and performer renowned for his five studio albums of innovative electronic music, his live performances in both contemporary and classical settings, and his extensive body of work in film scores. Deacon has premiered compositions at Carnegie Hall, Lincoln Center, Barbican Center, and Walt Disney Concert Hall and has collaborated with artists and institutions including Kronos Quartet, Sō Percussion, the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, L.A. Philharmonic, and the New York City Ballet. Deacon has toured internationally with popular recording artists including Arcade Fire, Miley Cyrus, and the Flaming Lips. His albums include Spiderman of the Rings, Bromst, Gliss Riffer, and his latest, 2020's Mystic Familiar. Deacon's original film and television scores include Twixt (directed by Francis Ford Coppola, 2011), Rat Film (directed by Theo Anthony, 2016), and Well Groomed (directed by Rebecca Stern, 2019). Three projects scored by Deacon premiered at this year's Sundance Film Festival: Strawberry Mansion (directed by Albert Birney and Kentucker Audley) and the documentaries Philly D.A. (Independent Lens, PBS) and All Light, Everywhere (directed by Theo Anthony). Jessica Kingdon's Ascension, scored by Deacon, premiered at this spring's Tribeca Film Festival, winning best documentary feature. Deacon is working on his next studio album as well as scores for an HBO original series and a feature film for Netflix.

Nicole Pearce

Nicole Pearce is a multidisciplinary artist living in Queens whose work has been seen across the U.S., Cuba, England, Germany, Japan, Korea, Italy, New Zealand, and Russia. Selected dance credits include Alvin Ailey American Dance Theater, American Ballet Theater, Atlanta Ballet, Dance Heginbotham, Dance Theater of Harlem, Gallim, Houston Ballet, Hubbard Street, Malpaso, Mark Morris Dance Group, and New York City Ballet. Selected opera credits include work with Juilliard, Minnesota Opera, Opera Montreal, Arizona Opera, and LA Opera. Selected theater credits include Arena Stage, Hartford Stage, Long Wharf Theater, McCarter Theater, the Play Company, the Playwrights Realm, Philadelphia Theater Company, and Pittsburgh Public Theater. Her installation of 1,000 paintings, *Tiny Paintings*

for Big Hearts, is open to doctors, nurses, staff, and patients of Elmhurst Hospital in Queens.

Tiffany Chen

Tiffany Chen, a Chinese-American artist, designer, and assistant based in New York, is a graduate of North Carolina School of the Arts. She is a costume apprentice alumna of Juilliard. Her works include *Bliss: The Musical, Wives, Kristina Wong: Sweatshop Overlord*, and *Once Upon a One More Time*. She has collaborated with theaters including Playwrights Horizons, Ars Nova, New York Theatre Workshop, National Black Theater, and Santa Fe Opera.

Benjamin Burton

Benjamin Burton (he/him) is a New York-based costume designer. He is an alumnus of costume training programs at Juilliard, Williamstown Theatre Festival, Trinity Shakespeare Festival, and the University of Oklahoma. His recent work has been as a supporting member of costume design teams for productions by NBC, the Public Theater, and the Drama League. Burton is grateful to be collaborating again with the wonderful artists and staff at Juilliard.

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Trisha Brown was the doyenne of postmodern dance: Her 1983 masterwork *Set and Reset* features a score by Laurie Anderson and sets by Robert Rauschenberg. However, this "reset" is created with the students and design collaborators using the material and ideas from the original. Juilliard Dance will present its own version of the piece (choreography, set, lighting design) in March as part of the Spring Dances program, which also features choreographer Aszure Barton's *return to patience* with a piano score by Caroline Shaw that incorporates a Chopin mazurka as well as Jawole Willa Jo Zollar's passionate work about people being displaced after the devastation of Hurricane Katrina, *Shelter*.

Henning Rübsam's course will give an introduction to the works and will feature a reflection by students in discussion with class participants the week following the performance. A ticket to the performance on Thursday, March 24 is included in course fee.
