## Doug Wamble

From listening to his mother play piano in their Baptist church to his grandfather singing cowboy songs, murder ballads, and old-time gospel favorites while strumming a guitar, Memphis native Doug has been immersed in music for his entire life. After completing two music degrees, he moved to New York to seek a career as a guitarist and composer. He appeared on bandstands and recordings with Wynton Marsalis, Norah Jones, Steven Bernstein, Courtney Love, Madeleine Peyroux, and Cassandra Wilson, then was signed to Branford Marsalis' label, Marsalis



Music/Rounder Records, for his albums Country Libations and Bluestate. A self-titled album on Koch/E1 Records was followed by a singer/songwriter album on his Halcyonic Records imprint, Fast as Years, Slow as Days. In 2014, his first all-instrumental recording, Rednecktelectual, featured his original compositions, all performed on a single guitar using nontraditional recording techniques and treating the resophonic guitar like a bass, a drum, and a piano simultaneously. Other releases include For Anew and an acoustic jazz record, The Traveler, a song cycle commissioned by Jazz at Lincoln Center. Wamble's history with Wynton Marsalis led to contributions on the soundtracks of the Ken Burns documentaries Prohibition, Unforgivable Blackness, The Central Park Five, The Vietnam War, Jackie Robinson, The Dust Bowl, and Muhammed Ali. In 2022, Wamble scored his first dramatic feature, The Subject, directed by fellow Memphian-turned-New Yorker Lanie Zipoy. Since 2012, Wamble has been the producer and touring musical director/guitarist for his wife, Morgan James (BM '03, voice). In 2022, Blues in the Present Tense, Wamble's first album of original acoustic music, was released. Steeped in his love of Ornette Coleman and Dewey Redman, the Delta blues, the gospel music of Blind Willie Johnson and Son House, and resonator guitar enthusiast Chris Whitley, it features the legendary rhythm section of Eric Revis and Jeff "Tain" Watts, as well as Branford Marsalis on saxophones.

## The Blue Guitars

Guitar collector Scott Chinery asked 21 premier luthiers to pay homage to the iconic luthier Jimmy D'Aquisto with an original guitar, following D'Aquisto's passing in 1995. The builders had to abide by the specifications of D'Aquisto's Blue Centura Deluxe: They had to construct an 18-inch archtop in the same shade of blue as the Centura Deluxe. The original Blue Guitars collection comprises 22 of the finest archtop guitars ever created, with the addition of six new blue guitars commissioned in the last year.
