### Laurie Smukler

Laurie Smukler (BM, '77, violin) grew up in Cleveland and started performing early, winning local competitions, and playing as a soloist with the Cleveland Orchestra at age 14. At Juilliard, she studied with Ivan Galamian. As a soloist, she has performed with many regional and national orchestras, and as a recitalist plays regularly in New York and in other centers including Tokyo and Seoul. She frequently presents master classes at conservatories across the country, such as the Shepherd School of Rice University, Peabody Conservatory, University of Michigan, University of Tennessee at Memphis, and Oberlin College. She was an original member and founding first violinist of the Mendelssohn String Quartet, which she toured with internationally for eight years. She has performed and toured with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and Musicians From Marlboro. With her husband, violist Ira Weller, she directed and performed in the series The Collection in Concert at the Morgan Library for 10 years. She joined the Juilliard faculty in 2014 and also teaches at the Manhattan School of Music and Bard College Conservatory of Music. On the faculty of the Kneisel Hall Chamber Music Festival for more than 20 years, she is now also its artistic director. She has premiered works by many contemporary composers including Ned Rorem, Morton Subotnik, Steven Paulus, Shulamit Ran, and Bruce Adolphe.



### Robert McDonald

Pianist Robert McDonald (MM, '79, piano) has toured extensively as a soloist and chamber musician throughout the U.S., Europe, Asia, and South America. He has performed with major orchestras in the U.S. and was a recital partner with violinist Isaac Stern for many years. He has participated in the Marlboro, Casals, and Lucerne festivals, performed with the Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center and for broadcasts on BBC Television. He has also appeared with the Takács, Vermeer, Juilliard, Brentano, Borromeo, American, Shanghai, and St. Lawrence string guartets as well as with Musicians From Marlboro. McDonald's prizes include the gold medal at the Busoni International Piano Competition, top prize at the William Kapell International Competition, and Deutsche Schallplatten Critics Award. His teachers include Theodore Rehl, Seymour Lipkin, Rudolf Serkin, Mieczyslaw Horszowski, Beveridge Webster, and Gary Graffman. He holds degrees from Lawrence University, the Curtis Institute of Music, Manhattan School of Music, and Juilliard. A member of Juilliard's piano faculty since 1999, he has taught at the Curtis Institute since 2007, where he holds the Penelope P. Watkins Chair in piano studies, During the summer, he is the artistic director of New Mexico's Taos School of Music and Chamber Music Festival.
